ANZAC DAY 2004

It was a dark and cool morning as the Gunners; past and present started to gather with their partners at Hobbs Artillery Park, Irwin Barracks Karrakatta.

The entrance to the Drill Hall via the Gun Park was lined with a tunnel that stretched half way to the gates. The tunnel started with the Battery Guns lined up, three either side, ready to fire, under camouflage netting and continued up the ramp through the 11 x 11 tents to the Drill Hall which was very well "camouflaged" with hanging parachutes, draping cam nets, sand bags and the popular two up ring. The Bty display of past artillery pieces shone brightly at every corner. The Bar was well set up as the table was flanked by two army trailers, which were to serve as the "eskies" for the day. The light filtering through the parachute silk and cam nets provided a real "field" atmosphere.



As the people walked through and out to the front of HAP, the scene took on a different meaning. Lit up against the morning Dawn was the opulent new Artillery Memorial Wall, erected in honour of all Gunners, past, present and serving.



The contrast of the brightly-lit wall against the surrounding colours and the still morning darkness was striking.

The Battery Chaplain, Captain Ian Johnson dedicated the Memorial in a brief but poignant ceremony prior to the Anzac Day Dawn Service, which the Bty carried out superbly. Wreaths were laid by the Col Commandant Western Region, Brigadier Richard Lawler, the Battery Commander, Major Scott Sullivan and the Presidents of the RAA Association of WA, 3 Field Regiment RAA Association and the Royal Australian Artillery Historical Society.



After the service, all gathered (approx 150) enjoyed a hearty Gunfire Breakfast provided by the Bty.



The march through town followed during the morning and was well attended by the Gunner contingent. The weather was very hot during the march, but again the people of Perth were out in force to cheer the old and present Diggers.

Upon return to HAP around midday, the festivities started in earnest with old Gunners swapping the usual histories with old mates and new Gunners alike. Steadily but surely the "eskies" were being emptied and merriment and camaraderie figured very highly throughout the afternoon. A big Thank You to the BC, Major Sullivan and all members of the Bty.

CLCA

We are working on some new initiatives for Gunners with the Tactical UAV battery staffing plan being developed and a JTAC (FAC- Ground for old timers) Troop to be raised as part of 1 GL GP. The Reserve Roles and Tasks Review enters the next phase of analysis and committees soon so things are moving fast. Training

- Conducted training in preparation for EX CHAU PHA 10 21 May 04 at HRTA.
- Training has included individual weapon training and live fire qualification practices, gun section level amphibious training, battery level air mobile training, simulated JOST technical missions and fire planning training, battery level deployment training, parachute continuation training by A Fd Bty, JNCO leadership training, and a Brigade CPX.
- "A" Fd Bty are to conduct airborne operations on EX ARNHEM with 3 RAR during the end of May.

Support to the Forward Air Controller Course Exercise ARMENTIERES was conduct by 7 Fd Regt at Singleton Training Area at the end of March. The exercise was conducted in two phases:

Phase 1. Deployment exercise 19-21 Mar 04. This phase was conducted dry due to the ammunition suspension on the M739A1 fuse.

Phase 2. Support to FAC course 22-26 Mar 04. The regiment provided smoke and illumination for the FAC to indicate targets.

The exercise was the first time for five months the regiment had conducted an LFX. With many changes in personnel it was a sound start with many lessons being learned by what is in essence a new team. The results of the exercise were good with all members working hard to achieve the exercise aims. Despite the ammunition restrictions the Regiment provided smoke and illumination for the FAC course to indicate targets. Thanks go to 131 STA Bty who provided a ½ MET Troop, 8 CSSB for a medic, and 1 MP Bn for traffic control.

16 AD Regt

March - April 2004

You may well be aware that 16 AD Regt is currently going through a transition process from its current structure to an all RBS70 Regiment by December 2005. As part of this process the Regiment is currently undergoing a significant amount of change in personnel, equipment and facilities. Rapier remains an effective and capable system, and continues to be busy, with 110 AD Bty preparing to deploy Rapier to

manning has grown from 250 in 2000 to its current strength of 413. With two more IET courses programmed this year, the Regt is expected to grow to 440 by Christmas.

Operationally, the Regiment had slowed from it busy pace of RBS70 detachment deployments to the Gulf. However the Regiment continues to support operations with MAJ Steve Terek currently deployed as an UNMO on OP CITADEL and CPL Dan Sells deployed as a Communications Watch Officer on OP CATALYST. WO2 Michael Rossendell, the RAP WO, has just returned to the Regiment after completion of his tour in East Timor.

The Woodside Barracks skyline is currently changing with the ongoing construction of the Advanced Air Defence Simulator (AADS). The 10 million-dollar project under Land 19 Phase 2B will deliver a combined immersive environment for RBS70 Detachment engagement simulations. The new simulator, providing 4th generation technology, is four stories high and will not only be able to offer a 270 degree simulation of various tactical scenarios, but can also simulate different climatic conditions by day or night. The AADS construction is progressing, and the simulator is scheduled to be officially handed over to 16 AD Regt in November.

The Regt held a poignant ANZAC Day Dawn Service on the Parade Ground at Woodside Barracks on 25 Apr. The service was led by our female Regimental Padre (Madre) Chaplain Caitie Inches-Ogden, and included not only the Regiment and their spouses, but also Army and Airforce Cadets as well as local scout groups. The cold, still Woodside morning provided a sobering setting for all the Regiment to reflect on past sacrifices.

7 Fd Bty

The Battery is now well into the training year and has conducted an Annual Field Exercise in Mar (Exercise Amiens). This EX completed five of the seven non-continuous courses being run by the Battery this calendar year. The main focus has been, and continues to be, on RRF, recruiting, AIRN compliance, and maintaining Rank and Trade within the Battery.

COURSES & RANK TRADE

The Battery is running several non-continuous courses, which include; ROBC Mod 1, Advanced Gunners, Gunner Grade 1 Mod 3, M2A2 conversion, ICT, RAA Safety Officers, and the Supervisor Offensive Support Gen Leg courses. The conduct of these courses is having a large positive effect on the number of Rank and Trade qualified members within the Battery.

SUPPORT

The Battery continues to provide a large amount of support to 13 Bde in various support

tasks. Earlier in the year the Battery also provided support to AFG for the Australia Day Salute in Canberra, in the form of the BG and four Numbers One.

MULTI USER DEPOT

The Rockingham MUD is now fully operational, with the Battery currently manning one detachment there. Recruiting in the area is proving successful and the Battery fully expects to be able to man two detachments in that location by the end of 04. In addition, the new members are readily making themselves available for attendance at Rank and Trade courses.

ANZAC DAY

The new memorial wall was consecrated prior to this year's Dawn Service at Hobbs Artillery Park. The wall has as a centrepiece the inscribed foundation stone from the home of Lieutenant General Sir Talbot Hobbs and was the product of much work by members of the 3 Fd Regt Artillery Association, with support from the Artillery Historical Society. Attendance, including the march through the city, was excellent and a very enjoyable day was had by all.

CONCLUSION

7 Field Battery is now building up to field activities, including a Live Fire Exercise, in May and June, as well as a second Annual Field Exercise in the second half of the year. The Battery continues to recruit well and is maintaining a very busy training schedule.

16 Fd Bty

16 Fd Bty has hit the ground running after a much enjoyed Easter break. The Bty deployed to Stoney Head Training Area for the weekend 17 - 18 Apr on Ex Island Guns. Accompanying the battery was the Commander Land Command Artillery (CLCA) and his Team, which came down to Australia's soft under belly to observe the Bty's training. The Bty was able to field two fully manned guns and a CP, which is an improvement on previous outings. Late changes to the manning saw many key personnel change into roles for which they had little experience or training. The Bty was able to conclude the ICT M2A2 Course who qualified eight Gunners and conduct testing for several Supervisors OS competencies. The highlight for the Bty was the proofing of WP M739A1 so as the remainder of that ammunition could be released for wider use. This increased the ammunition for the weekend and gave the battery 219 rounds of various natures. Overall, a successful weekend with many valuable lessons learned and some very positive feedback from the CLCA staff.

The Bty has also had visits from the Regimental Master Gunner and his team from CATC and RSM — A, who made the trip South to visit all the Units on the Island. Next on the agenda for 16 Fd Bty was ANZAC Day which saw the Battery providing support to various RSL's island wide, as well as supporting the marches in both Hobart and Launceston.

The Bty will deploy up to Buckland Training Area on the weekend 21 - 23 May for the annual IMT Exercise "Ubique Challenge". The main emphasis will be to catch up on training shortfalls and to widen the Bty's knowledge on minor infantry tactics.

All in all a busy time for the Bty, but with members showing very good commitment we are achieving some good training results.

Proof and Experimental Establishment Graytown

Proof and Experimental Establishment Graytown began operation in 1968 when the proof establishment at Fort Gellibrand closed and activities were relocated to Graytown.

(The first Australian proof was fired at Fort Gellibrand in 1924 on No. 80 fuzes and Number 1 primers for the 18lb gun).

As a result of a review into logistic support to Defence in March 2004, the Chief of the Defence Force approved the formation of the Joint Proof and Experimental Unit incorporating Proof and Experimental Establishment Graytown, Proof and Experimental Establishment Port Wakefield and the Command element in Sydney. With effect 1 May 04, LTCOL Gary Potter was appointed by the CA as the first Commanding Officer of the Joint Proof and Experimental Unit.

Tasking:

Proof Firing of Refurbished M2A5 Recoil Systems.

Proof firings of six refurbished recoil mechanisms refurbished at Southern Logistic Group Bandiana for use in the 105mm Howitzers M2A2 was conducted in April 04. Recoils overhauled at this facility are to be proven by firing before reentering service.

Standard M1 propellant charges used with either HES or Practice rounds, recoil lengths for given charges and elevations recorded.

SMIG's Review

7 Field Battery 3rd Field Regiment RAA

The Battery during March and April has continued its high tempo, having conducted an AFX, completed five of the seven non-continuous courses started at the beginning of the year and further established the Battery's presence at the Multi-User Depot at Rockingham (60 minutes south of 13 BDE).

The start of March saw the Battery continue its build up for the much-anticipated AFX Exercise Amiens, the major Live Fire Exercise for the Guns for the first half of the calendar year. Concurrent to these preparations, the unit continued to conduct courses such as the

Supervisor OS Module 3 and the ROBC Module 1, with the Live Fire qualification component planned for the AFX.

Unfortunately, due to blanket ammunition restrictions across the Corp, the Battery was unable to Live Fire and had to move quickly to implement its contingency plan: Exercise Amiens Alternate. Following 3 days of DFX'ing at Lancelin, the Battery moved to the Bindoon Training area for 4 days of ranges training, encompassing F89 Conversion, F1/F3 Grenades and Night Fighting Equipment courses. Those members not occupied with this training conducted CPX'ing, Local Defence and other Artillery related activities. The Battery was able to achieve maximum value from Exercise Amiens Alternate, with Live Fire training

shortfalls scheduled to be picked up with Exercise Return to Amiens in late June.

The battery has continued to focus on achieving 100 percent rank and trade compliance, a task made all the easier by the unit's already good standing in this area. The training run within the battery throughout March and April included an M2A2 conversion as well as Advanced Gunners and Gunner Grade 1 Module 3 courses.

7 Field Battery's presence at the multiuser depot (shared with 11/28 RWAR) 60 minutes south of Perth has continued to strengthen, currently in the form of a gun detachment plus. Recruiting has been highly successful, with 2 full detachments projected to be in location by the end of the calendar year.

7 Field Battery has continued its strong support of Brigade tasks, as well as recently providing the Battery Guide and 4 Number One's to the AFG in Canberra for the Australia Day salute; help which will be provided again in June for the Queens Birthday Salute.

The Gunners of WA commemorated ANZAC Day with a Battery dawn service, attended by numerous service members, past and present, as well as many family and friends. Following a Gunfire breakfast, the Battery took part in the traditional march through Perth City and returned to the unit for an afternoon of mixed activities. The day was an outstanding success, with the battery honouring and celebrating the spirit of ANZAC.

In conclusion, 7 Field Battery remains strongly committed to its goals, and will move towards the end of the 03/04 TY in excellent standing to achieve all future tasks.

NADZAB Day Plus 60 Years - The Sequel

THIS ARTICLE IS A FOLLOW-ON FROM JUMPING INTO HISTORY' WHICH WAS PUBLISHED IN THE 'RAA LIAISON LETTER 2003 - SPRING EDITION'.

As the noonday sunlight filtered through gum trees, a large family gathering at Chau Pha Lines, Townsville watched the approach of a Dodge command car towing a small green gun. The vehicle delivered a smartly-dressed young officer and a senior citizen through an honour guard of soldiers dressed in Second World War uniforms. The visitors were introduced as paragumer Keith Begbie and a representative 2nd/4th Field Regiment Captain 'Roos Marsden' resplendent in his namesake's old service dress with Africa Star, service and wound stripes.

'Of the original 31 members of the 2nd/4th Field Regiment who parachuted into Nadzab with two 25-Pounder Shorts on 5th September 1943, only ten have survived this sixtieth anniversary', announced Colonel Commandant and honorary unit historian Arthur Burke to the large gathering of the unit's 'family' - the spouses, partners, children, parents and members of 4th Field Regiment.

'Of the 212 Shorts manufactured during the war, only 20 of them are known to have survived', he continued. 'To commemorate that historic jump, paragumer Keith Begbie has been reunited with a 'baby' 25-Pounder here today.'

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Gun Nomenclature and History – WA 6 in Coast Guns

There appears to be a misunderstanding when describing the various 6 in coast guns mounted in Western Australia over the years.

First perhaps it would be an idea if the various initials used in describing ordnance were listed.

SBML – Smooth Bore Muzzle Loading. Describes a weapon with a smooth bore and loaded at the muzzle.

RBL – Rifled Breech Loading. A weapon loaded at the breech end. The projectile being rammed until the driving band on the projectile struck the rifling in the barrel. A bagged charge was then introduced behind the projectile. This nomenclature was in use until about 1870 when the methods of manufacture of ordnance changed and newer types of breechblocks were introduced.

RML – Rifled Muzzle Loading. Introduced during the period 1870 to 1880. The bore of the gun was machined with a number of rifling groves and the projectile was fitted with brass studs, which matched the gun's rifling pitch. In this case a bag of propellant was rammed down from the muzzle into the chamber followed by the projectile, the studs on which had to match the rifling grooves.

BL – Breech Loading. Loaded from the breech and rammed until the driving band of the projectile engaged the rifling. This was followed by a bagged charge. The ammunition was listed as "separate". These applied to steel built guns for the period 1870 – 1890 and then wire built guns from 1890 onwards.

QF – Quick Firing. As for above except the ammunition was "fixed", in other words, the projectile and the propellant in a brass cartridge were married together and loaded at the same time.

BLC - Breech Loading, Converted. Some of the earlier model BL guns were modified to enable them to withstand the pressures of newer propellants as they were introduced. They may also have been fitted with the single motion breech mechanism which enabled an increase in the rounds per minute they were capable of achieving.

QFC – Quick Firing, Converted. In the mid 1890s controversy reined as to whether the services should be buying BL or QF guns. A number of the older BL guns were converted. The breeches were modified to accept the fixed ammunition and

at the same time they were strengthened to accept the increased pressures of the new propellants.

Guns were also identified by marques, which they were given as change in manufacturing methods, design improvement, etc took place. They could also be built for naval use, land service or combined.

The 6-inch guns, with which the forts in Western Australia were equipped, comprised the following

Ordnance BL 6 inch Mk IV
Ordnance BL 6 inch Mk VI
Ordnance BL 6 inch Mk VII
Ordnance BL 6 inch Mk XI
Ordnance QFC 6 inch "B" Mk II

The Mk IV and VI guns were emplaced at Albany in 1893. Guns of this type were introduced into service in the mid 1880s. The question has been asked why were the two marques introduced in the same fortress. The Treatise of Service Armament – 1908 indicate there was a slight variation in the gun manufacture, which did not affect the ballistic characteristics. Outwardly it is not possible to note any variation. One of each type of these marques are still to be found in the Princess Royal Fortress at Albany.

The Mk VII guns were emplaced at Fort Arthur Head in 1906, later moved to Leighton 6 inch Battery in 1943 and then to Albany in 1945, Fort Forrest in 1908, later moved to Fort Swanbourne in 1938.

The Mk XI guns were emplaced at Bickley Battery – Rottnest Island in 1938.

The QFC "B" Mk II replaced the older Mk IV and VI guns at Albany in 1939.

In 1910 the 6-inch MkVII gun was selected as the standard gun for coast defence installations through out the British Empire. They come into service around 1895. They were primarily for close defence tasks that is actions up to about 9000 metres with the standard Carriage Garrison, Central Pivot Mk II. A carriage was also available which gave an elevation of 35° which, enabled them to be used in counter bombardment tasks. The ordnance was 7 tons in weight and 45 calibres in length.

The Mk XI gun was originally based on British Admiralty specifications. They were 9 tons in

weight and 50 calibres in length. They came into Australian service as the main armament for the "Chatham" type "Town" class cruisers purchased as part of the Australian fleet expansion between 1911 and 1913.

Early in the 1930s HMAS "Sydney" and HMAS Melbourne were decommissioned and sent to the United Kingdom to be scrapped. Their main armament of 8 – 6 inch guns were removed and put into reserve. HMAS "Brisbane" was sent to the United Kingdom at a later date but retained her armament although there would have been guns held in reserve at the Naval Armament Depot.

During the 1930s, with the upgrading of coastal defences around Australia the Navy released 19 of the guns to the Army. Two such guns were sent to Western Australia in 1936 to temporarily equip Fort Swanbourne and then to Rottnest Island in 1938 to arm Bickley Battery. This again on a temporary basis until barrels with less wear became available. Due to their increased range they provided a counter bombardment task in conjunction with the 9.2 inch Oliver Hill Battery.

The F1 gun of Bickley Battery No. 2328 had originally been mounted on HMAS "Brisbane" on 14th September 1914. It was later in the Great War returned for re-tubing and eventually returned to Australia where it was held at Sydney until issued to the Army in 1938. This piece is displayed at the Leighton Battery Heritage site.

The F2 gun No. 2309 was built by Vickers, Son and Maxim in 1912 and mounted on HMAS "Melbourne". It was removed from HMAS "Melbourne" for re-tubing by the Royal Gun Factory during the Great War and it is understood was returned to Australia in the 1920s where it was held in reserve until issued to the Army in 1938. It is now displayed at the Kingstown Barracks at Rottnest.

There has been an ongoing story that the Bickley Battery guns were formerly mounted on HMAS

"Sydney" however this is not correct. Four complete Mk XI guns remain in Australia. Two are on display at the Darwin East Point Military Museum, One is at the naval museum at Garden Island, New South Wales and another gun is at the Australian War Memorial.

There is quite a story concerning the QFC 6-inch "B" Mk II guns, which were emplaced at Albany in 1939. At the close of the 19th Century, the Colony of New South Wales sent four of their BL 6-inch Elswick Ordnance Company guns back to the United Kingdom to be converted to QFguns.

At the time of the Committee of Inquiry 1901, one of these guns had been returned and the others were listed as being "in England to be chase hoped and converted to QF". On their return three of the guns were emplaced at South Head Battery and the fourth gun was believed to have been sent to Hobart for ordnance training purposes. In 1938 two of the guns were replaced and sent to Albany to replace the old Mk IV and Mk VI guns. The remaining gun at South Head was retained as the Examination gun until 1942. It was then sent to New Zealand.

The nomenclature of the guns, apart from the initials QFC, has always posed a query however on 30th June 1943 an equipment audit listed the weapons as QFC 6 in "B" Mk II. Subsequent research of recent times has given an explanation. QF is self explanatory, the "C" indicated that it was a converted gun, the "B" indicated it had been fitted with the more modern single motion, breech mechanism. Mk II indicated the piece had undergone a number 2 conversion. Details supporting this explanation are to be found in the "Treatise of Service Ordnance — 1908" publication.

Unfortunately the Albany ordnance was scrapped apparently around 1952. The only remaining weapon of its type is now to be found at the Peirson Park Reserve near Hobart. When last seen by the writer, the weapon was incorrectly assembled and in very poor condition.

DID YOU KNOW.....

Mottos of the Regiment

Since the establishment of Artillery Units in Australia, there have been a number of mottos adopted by gunners. These have included:

• **'PRO ARIS ET FOCIS'** (For Fields and Hearths) – Queensland Field Artillery and the Tasmanian and South Australian Garrison Artillery;

- 'CUSTODES PORTARUM' (Guardians of the Gates) Queensland, Victorian and New South Wales Australian Garrison Artillery (Militia);
- 'SI VIS PACEM PARA BELLUM' (If you want Peace, prepare for War) Western Australian Field Artillery;
- 'CAVE FULMEN MEI' (Beware My Fire) Australian Garrison Artillery No 1 South Australian Company;
- 'JAMAIS ARRIERA' (Always to the Fore) Western Australia Garrison Artillery; and
- **'SEMPER FIDELIS'** (Always Faithful) Original motto of the New South Wales Artillery (There is a line of thought that the motto was **'SEMPER PARATUS'** (Always Ready). This is incorrect; never-the-less A Field Battery has now adopted the motto).

After Federation the single motto 'CONSENSU STABILES' was adopted. It is apparent there were three interpretations of the translation accepted: Strong in Agreement; Firm and Ready; and the most widely accepted, Firm and Steadfast.

In 1950 His Majesty King George VI granted The Royal Regiment of Australian Artillery the two mottos of The Royal Regiment of Artillery:

'UBIQUE' (Everywhere), and

'QUO FAS ET GLORIA DUCUNT' (Where Right and Glory Lead).

Well, it is most pleasing to report that the System is now fully operative and was "tested" before a group of Seniors who visited the Site on Wednesday 19 May 2004. The visitors were most impressed and congratulated the Society for its initiative. The Duty Guides were also similarly impressed, as it was the first occasion some had to participate in the new venture.

It is proposed to conduct a small "commissioning ceremony" for the benefit of the Sponsors on Friday 25th June 2004 and the Mayor of the Town of Mosman Park has been invited to unveil the plaque.

RESTORATION WORKSHOP "FLOODED"!

NO! The roof has not blown off – we are referring to the volume of work to be undertaken by the Restoration Team.

Following a relatively quiet period of two months, requests have virtually "flooded in". Firstly, the City of South Perth requested our support in refurbishing a 170mm German Mortar (Minenwerfer) that had been allocated to the Municipality as a Trophy of WWI in 1920. For many years it has been on display at the City's War Memorial at the corner of Labouchere Road and Angelo Street in South Perth and despite its age, the Mortar has been well preserved but naturally is showing signs of deterioration. The Society has been commissioned to carry out essential restoration to the weapon and extend its display significance for years to come.

Hard on the heels of the Minenwerfer, Navy League of WA delivered 2 Sir W. G. Armstrong 3inch RBL 1881 Naval Guns complete with Carriage and Slide to the Restoration Workshop. These Guns have been on display outside the Naval Reserve Cadet "Training Ship Perth" at East Fremantle. After restoration they will be returned for display — one hopes under cover.

There will be little time to spare in the Workshop for the next 12 months!

Dear Gabriel.

In the last issue of Artillery WA an article was featured dealing with the historic airborne drop of a section of the 2/4 Field Regt. into the Nadzab valley in New Guinea. In that article two photographs of the short 25 pdr. gun were featured.

It is interesting to note that these two photographs are of guns in action with the 2nd Field Regt, AIF in the Bougainville campaign. The photographs were taken in May/June 1945 and the two guns were part of 4 Bty. I was an FOO (Forward Observation Officer) with that Regt. and made the photographs available to the RAAHS when they were rebuilding a short 25 pdr.gun.

The 2nd Field Regt. had 4 & 5 Batteries equipped with short 25 pdr. guns whilst 6 Bty. Used the normal 25 pdr. The short 25 pdr. was a much criticised gun but considering that it was designed and produced in a matter of months it filled a much needed weapon for use in the jungle. Admittedly it was difficult to keep it properly layed in a sustained period of firing, but it was extremely manoeuvrable and could be manhandled in and out of position by the gun crew and towed practically anywhere behind a jeep.

The 2nd Field Regt, was disbanded after the war and is now only represented by a Reunion Association. The gun crews in the photographs were lads of 18 and 19 and those still left are now approaching 80. Of the Regt's 700 odd complement in 1945 only about 170 are now left. The Regt also has two unenviable records. It was in continuous action for a total of 247 days without relief and fired 70,776 rounds of ammunition against the enemy, more than any other Aust. Fd. Regt.

The Bougainville campaign was fought against a well trained and equipped numerically superior Japanese army. This campaign was hardly referred to in 1944/45 and was swept under the carpet post war. The Aust. 3rd. Division suffered 2500 casualties including 516 killed in action - a casualty list more extensive than most other Island campaigns. In retrospect it was quite ineffective as the isolated Japanese posed no problem and were effectively contained by the American forces prior to their relief by the Australian army. This may be of interest to readers of Artillery WA


