## ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATIVE MARCH PROTOCOLS

- All marchers should conform to forming up and marching 4 abreast
- Veterans should march directly behind their unit banner, accompanied by one carer if needed. That carer should be of an age where they directly assist the veteran.
- Veterans having difficulty completing the march are encouraged to use the transport provided, but must remain in the vehicle until the march is complete.
- If a veteran must fall out of the march, he/she should be directed to a Marshall for assistance. Unit associations should continue so as not to disrupt the movement of the march.
- NOK should march behind the veterans and be old enough to march the full distance without assistance. Please note baby prams are not permitted.
- NOK representation should be restricted to 1 per veteran. Attire should be neat and tidy out of respect to the fallen (torn denim, sporting attire, dirty joggers etc are not appreciated).
- Carrying pictures of relatives is not supported.
- NOK are to wear medals on the right breast (left breast is reserved for the original owners).
- Media services have been advised not to conduct interviews "on the move" during the march.
- Veterans are requested not to join or leave the march other then at the Assembly or Dispersal points.
- Preferred dress: coat and tie, with beret.

We would be grateful if you adopted these guidelines and by doing so you will not only your fallen comrades and forebears, but you will also help maintain the ANZAC tradition we are all so proud of.

### SPEECH AT GUNNERS OFFICERS DINNER 2010

As read by Brian's Hancock's eldest son Paul

#### "A thousand pounds would not buy a seat at this table"

Thus Captain McCallum in this very Drill hall at the dinner to celebrate the feast of Saint Barbara in 1957 or 58 placed a value on this meal by the regular Army officer; who was at that time the heart and soul of the 24<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Heavy Anti-Aircraft Artillery. What Captain McCallum meant was that you were either entitled to be here, were invited to be there or were not able even to buy your way in. This same man who marched into Burt Street Artillery Barracks in the early thirties before even I was born, as a gunner .just a recruit, but still a gunner.

I have attended most Gunner Officers Dinners since then, all bar a few when I was overseas or work or family kept me away, for almost 40 of them driving up from Bunbury or over from Narrogin.

They were great dinners --- a bit riotous sometimes but great dinners.

I can clearly remember an old Artillery captain who wore the same uniform that he had tailored for himself whilst in London in 1917. Boy! What tales he could tell. He could recite blue poetry forever, Eskimo Nell and Tiger Lilly are two I recall.

But the main topic I wanted so badly to address is of the gun, the gunner, and the spirit of the gunner.

Kipling spoke of the guns in his poem of the mountain guns and described the effectiveness of the guns when he wrote:

'You can go where you please; you can skid up the trees, but you don't get away from the guns.'

Of the gunners here tonight who served them in the heat most of you can relate to this with Kipling here as he describes the beginning of another hot day so well

'Smoking me pipe on the mountings, sniffing the morning cool;'

And the Esprit de Corp that surrounded the gunner

With seventy gunners be'ind me; an' never a beggar forgets

It's only the pick of the Army that handles the dear little pets'

But it is not only Kipling who noted this phenomenon

Jac Weller in his epic "Wellington in the Peninsular" quoting a German source as saying that: 'The English artillerymen are the tallest strongest and handsomest men in the world '.

They were also pretty tough:

'... Guns were dragged up Mount Defiance in a single day which forced the surrender of Ticonderoga in 1777 '

#### and again

The behaviour of Tarleton's gunners at Cowpensa deserved mention 'every one of them was killed or incapacitated by wounds at their pieces '

*But what does it all mean?* asks the child. It means that gunners are a tough lot of bastards and they have spirit something that is not measured, except in the successful doing.

And it is this spirit of the gunner that I wish to speak of tonight.

I recall, with a tear in my eye, attending a dinner a few short years ago, leaving the mess and apologising to the Dining Vice President, apologising for my slowness at table due to my Parkinson's. He was having none of it!

I suggested that I would probably not attend again, we were both affected by wine, he said that I was a gunner and would always be welcome at the dinner I recall exactly what he said....

'You will always be welcome, even if we have to get you here on a stretcher, you will always be welcome; Once a gunner always a gunner'.

What a wonderful spirit of support.

But why did I join the CMF? (Citizens Military Force) I suppose it was because in the CMF I could learn to drive a truck and fire a rifle, not a pissy little CL 3 tonner but a great Mack tractor doing up to 3MPG on a good day, a little less on heavy going. Such as when set up for towing an 11 ½ ton Heavy Anti-Aircraft Gun across Garden Island, not by any road, but by making a road as you went. Tandem duels chained together like halftracks. Duel front wheels with a bloody great baulk of timber across the front bumper.

The rifle was not some insipid little 22 but a full bore .303" with bolt, ready to go and go it did most Sundays that you were not at a parade, out roo shooting !!!

You learned about responsibility, like the night I lent my jeep to a sergeant, Sergeant Richards by name, who promptly ran it into a tree. '*Who was driving?' 'I was Sir'* was the 'responsible 'answer and that is what they got. A court martial was avoided by replacing the chassis for under 12 pounds, the limit for a local charge; Yes I learned responsibility the hard way.

I recall the heat inside the Fire Control & Tactical control radar sets. They ran at an ambient minimum temperature of 30 degrees Celsius, which in the sun on Garden Island in mid summer tended to become quite hot. I recall the predictor which was a mechanical computer, perhaps one of the first such computers. The computer and FC radar both had spotting telescopes mounted and when everything was set correctly we could look down the FC radar set telescope and straight down the barrel of the centre 3.7 set 180 out of phase.

I could call and everybody gave a little cheer. Oh the joy of it all. But why did we care, we cared because we were gunners just like you tonight and we loved our guns.

They say today's youth don't care. Who says?? The opinion makers or the opinion holders, those who babble or those who follow their opinions to action.

So now we come to the third component of the triangle, the Spirit of the Gunner.

When I see the young lads marching at Guildford or at ANZAC Day at the dawn service I realise that I have little to fear, the spirit of the gunner is still there, it is only the bureaucrat that today's gunner must worry about and that, dear gentlemen is where we come in.

Can one man do anything! Of course he can, lets look at a few cases both inside and outside the service.

#### INSIDE THE SERVICE:

Captain Mac; had I asked him why he gave his all to a regiment he would have said simply that it was how it should be done.

A little story: When Mac was a Sergent at Burt Street barracks the CO ordered Mac to saddle his horse for him to go somewhere in a public display. Mac complied with the order but did not tighten the girth so that when the CO stepped aboard in front of the crowd he slipped under the horse's belly. Rising up the CO fixed McCallum with a look and said words to the effect that there was something awry with the girth? Whereupon McCallum stood rigidly to attention, and well aware that outside the barracks the great depression raged and that he had a wife and family to support said with conviction *"Sir, sergeants don't saddle horses."* To which the CO replied *"Quite right McCallum"*. Now that takes guts!

That was the measure of McCallum and his attitude to the job

#### OUTSIDE THE SERVICE:

When the Senate Parliamentary committee was investigating the Burt Street Barracks with a view to either sale or use as a museum, my brother himself, a gunner trained under McCallum, went along to the hearing as Mayor of East Fremantle and spoke for the retention of the Barracks. The soundness of his arguments and the fact that Local Government was in favour of the retention of the barracks caused the Senator to contact Ian after the hearing and promise support.

For my own part I was motivated to spend 31 years as the regional representative on the State body of the Defence Reserves Support Council.

A normal Sunday with a normal start at the Leighton Battery complex in Buckland Hill at Mosman Park. During the first of the days tours I had just arrived at the underground Battery Observation Post and was about to take my guests into the Officers Quarters when, to my great surprise, I was confronted by a rearing Tiger Snake. It was clearly very active and lively! I beat a dignified retreat and advised my guests of the situation. Things remained calm and we finished the tour, keeping a wary eye open for further encounters.

Having announced my finding back at the Command Post, Phil Pougnault, another rostered guide, bravely volunteered to help try and catch the snake and remove it to the surrounding reserve. He grabbed a leaf rake, myself a broom, and we headed back down into the danger zone. Cautiously approaching the Officers Quarters we discovered, to our concern, that the Tiger snake was no longer visible. With the use of a torch and trembling just a little, we located the snake trapped in the corner of the escape shaft. Boy was it lively! There in a well concealed box amongst some newspapers which heralded the start and the end of the Second World War in Europe was a copy of the *"Western Australian Chronicle"* circa 1832 of which the prime headline was

### "COLONY'S POPULATION ABOVE 1,500."

I showed it to Don Rae, very well known to us, and who by multitudinous stratagems and the support of Ronnie Roach' s extraordinary morning teas keeps we merry band of volunteers fully occupied and more or less con-tent. Don and I had visions of a holiday in the Bahamas or more probably a well healed Society. But, being cautious we decided to verify its authenticity by means of a visit to the Battye Library.

Oh Disappointment!. Although a copy of an original document it had been issued as a supplement to one of our newspapers to celebrate, as far as the lady to whom I spoke could recall the State's sesquicentenary and there were several copies in the library.

Nevertheless it is a very interesting read and the following are two extracts:
