PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Fellow Gunners,

Gunners' Day 2013 was a highly successful service with about 200 in attendance and well supported by the Shire of Swan as we celebrated Gunner's Day and the 100th Anniversary of Artillery in Guildford. Following the formalities many attended the Guildford Hotel for further refreshment and comradeship.

This year Gunner's Day will fall on Sunday 2 November which will clash with the Centenary celebrations to be held in Albany to mark the departure of the ANZAC contingent on their journey to the war and Gallipoli. We are aware that some 80 gunners and family will be attending the Albany celebrations. Accordingly, the Committee has decided that we will celebrate Gunner's Day 2014 on Sunday, 9 November 2014. We have received a \$1000 grant from the ANZAC Committee to provide catering for GUNNERS DAY 2014.

ANZAC PROJECTIONS & STORYTELLING 30.10.14 - 2.11.14

Using modern projection technology, the memorabilia preserved in Albany from the First World War will be brought to life for Anzac Albany. Images, video and personal accounts will convey the details of that time.

STIRLING TERRACE MESS HALL 30.10.14 - 2.11.14

The Stirling Terrace Mess Hall will be the home of food and drink for the community and visitors to Anzac Albany. Restaurants will pop up along the terrace with outdoor tables and stalls selling the best of Great Southern produce. Join the community and watch the ceremonial activities in Princess Royal Harbour from the Stirling Terrace Mess Hall.

ROYAL AUSTRALIAN NAVY CEREMONIAL SUNSET 31.10.14

The Royal Australian Navy Sunset Ceremony is one of the oldest Naval Ceremonies, dating back centuries to the age of sail. The ceremony reflects the worldwide naval tradition of saluting the lowering of the Ensign at sunset each day in harbour.

PRINCESS ROYAL HARBOUR LIGHTS 31.10.14

Princess Royal Harbour Lights will be an interpretive sound, lighting and pyrotechnic display on the harbour following sunset. Come down to the harbours edge on the eve of the centenary of the departure of the convoys, to commemorate the souls on board the ships, and the families they left behind.

TROOP MARCH 1.11.14

OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE NATIONAL ANZAC CENTRE 1.11.14

Located in the Princess Royal Fortress Military Museum, the National Anzac Centre will open on the day of the centenary of the First Convoy Departure. Curated in partnership with the Western Australian Museum, there will be an opportunity for people to experience a connection with the First World War. Cost of entry will apply.

COMMUNITY CONCERT 1.11.14

A community concert featuring The West Australian Symphony Orchestra with high profile Australian and New Zealand guests. The musical direction of the event will be respectful to the theme of commemorate, contemplate and educate, providing a contemporary event to commemorate the Anzac tradition that began in Albany 100 years ago to the day.

NAVAL SHIP OPEN DAY 2.11.14

Docking at the Albany Port, Naval ships participating in the Anzac Albany centenary commemorations will open for members of the public to tour. A very exciting opportunity, with many more details to be announced.

REFLECTIONS OVER THE WATER 2.11.14

The children's commemorative event will be a region wide program, encompassing an offering being placed into the Princess Royal Harbour to remember the lives of the 35,000 troops and sailors who sailed from Albany on November 1, 1914.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

(Presented at the AGM)

Good morning and welcome.

Our AGM is being conducted in the Leighton Command Post due to the 11/28 Battalion taking more floor space at the Drill Hall- the Committee thought it appropriate to meet here. We will offer a BBQ and tunnel tour later.

The past twelve months have seen our members putting in many hours of mental and physical labour which has benefited our Society. On your behalf I thank all concerned, especially those who go above and beyond.

The members of the 2013 Committee have continued to meet on a monthly basis and have steered your Society-financially and practically-I wish to acknowledge those office bearers for their input. Member Graham Mckenzie-Smith has been a welcome addition to the Committee.

The Treasurer's Report will show that the Society continues to operate within its means. Our bank balance is due to successful grant applications, the Tunnels fees, Members annual fees and selective sales of excess items from our inventory.

Our occupancy of the Annex at Karrakatta was of concern early in 2013,however by August we were advised by the Base Manager that no territorial claims were being entertained by 11/28 Battalion. So our occupancy is secure as far as we can see.

Turning now to our Leighton asset: 2013 saw a record number of visitors, 4030. Considering the physical restrictions that is an impressive number. All the more so because no accidents were reported. I thank all members who staff the site in all weathers and at a variety of times The public are treated to polite guides who can handle all levels of interest- and the guides can even deal with visiting reptiles!

The Society has received a number of letters and e-mails from appreciative individuals and groups who enjoyed our tours.

With the Command Post interior displays now complete our attention shifts to the large scale above ground displays.

The Heritage Council of WA, the WA Planning Commission and the Mosman Council have approved the resiting of our 3.7" gun and the introduction of a 40mm gun to a purpose built site near the crest of the hill outside the Command Post. On receipt of a Building Permit we will apply to Lottery West for a grant to offset the costs.

The visitor toilet is now finished right down to its "can't see me" paint scheme. This facility is only for our paying visitors.

Looking to the future regarding Special Projects, it has been brought to the Committees attention that Lottery West looks more favourably on organisations who can support their claims with a Site Interpretation Plan. Your Committee has engaged a professional business- "Creative Spaces"- to produce such a plan. Hard copy data has been given to it and an on-site walking of the ground above and below has also occurred.

Grant applications for 2014 begin in August.

A likely customer for funding will be one - perhaps both- of the authentic 6" gun shields currently in the Shire of Mornington Peninsula. As of this date ownership is still been sorted by the Shire. The C.E.O. let slip that he is a former West Australian, and knows of our tunnels. He thinks at least one shield should come our way. That being the case, we would wear the haulage costs. The Mosman Shire has kindly offered to store the 5 tonne shield at its local depot until we can arrange it on-site and marry it to our 6" barrel.

The reputation of what we offer the public has meant that our mid-week and evening tours are really taking off. An example should suffice- an advance booking has been accepted for 160 students who will tour the complex in the course of one day. Neil Lodge and his select band of guides are again commended for making it happen.

I have mentioned the Shire earlier. Your Society's excellent rapport with it, stems from member Don Rae who goes out of his way to keep all concerned in the loop.

To conclude my report, I again thank all members - active and passive, for another productive year I am pleased to note the likely addition of up to three new guides to add to our band. Our finances are strong, our skill base remains and the big ticket upgrades at Leighton Battery promise an interesting year to come. I would encourage all members present and those reading this Report to give serious consideration to nominating for one of the Committee seats - if only for a season- your input would be appreciated by all.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO YOU!



On Sunday, 22 December 2013, there were birthday celebrations at the Leighton Battery Heritage Site. Whose birthday you may well ask? It was the gun barrel's 100th birthday! It had probably never had a birthday party in all its 100 years since birth in 1913 at the Elswick Ordnance Company. Leighton Battery guides and cashiers with partners were out in force to celebrate the centenary. David Carter, President of the Royal Australian Artillery Historical Society of WA, was MC of the day to welcome the troops and get the party rolling.

Graham McKenzie Smith, guide and military historian, gave a short presentation of the long life of the Leighton barrel No 2328 from a Breech Loading Mk XI gun and let us know that the little Leighton beauty is one of the ten coastal artillery fighters still around today. It seems that these coast guns could have chalked up a heap of frequent flyer points on their travels around the world.

It has always been thought that the Leighton barrel was mounted on *HMAS Brisbane* in 1914 and returned to Woolwich Arsenal in May 1917 for 'anti-ageing' treatment that is relining. However, Graham has now ascertained that the *HMS Brisbane* was not launched until 1916 and had a quiet war, mainly on China Station; thus it would seem that the 2328 was probably mounted on another RN cruiser of the period. We know that in its infancy the Leighton barrel was held in Sydney in reserve but it was by no means 'an infant prodigy.' It was shipped around 'as a spare' and fostered out to the Admiralty in 1919. It visited Simonstown Naval Dockyard in South Africa 'as a spare' and as a teenager the Chatham Dockyard in 1925. It was probably one of three barrels sent to Australia in the 1930's in exchange for some worn out barrels.

What we do know for certain is that the Leighton beauty 2328 was installed at the F1 position at Bickley Battery on Rottnest in 1938. After the war there was an attempt to get rid of it when it was buried in the sand

on the Island. It recovered remarkably from this ordeal when at age 67 it was restored with full anti-ageing treatment by the Army at Midland and spent its transition into retirement at the old Army Museum at 'Dilhorn'. Finally, in 1997 at age 87, it found its retirement home at Leighton Battery Heritage Site. The next 100 years are looking very exciting as negotiations are underway to buy it a 6"gun shield that was discovered in a former tip in rural Victoria.

HOW THE LADS OF THE BATTERY DIED

When the blinding smoke of the Turkish shell Had cleared from the shattered Gun, To my comrades' help I leapt and ran. Three men who had served their Gun right well, Three grim Australians dealing Hell – Mick Taylor, Doug and a chap named Stan – And stricken every one!

Mick Taylor was crawling on the ground, Blood-blinded, dazed, but a man! "Are you badly hurt?" I asked. "Not me!" He tried to bluff. "I'm safe and sound!" (And fourteen wounds in him we found!) "It's only a scratch as you can see! Look after Doug and Stan!"

Thank God such men Australia bred!
I prayed that death might be quick.
I picked up Doug. He had lost one arm;
His leg was shattered; but all he said
Was, "Don't mind me!" and he raised his head.
"I'm done. I'm safe from further harm;
Look after Stan and Mick!"

Poor Stan! His life was ebbing low, I saw that he was done.
"I'm sorry", he moaned, "to make this row; I simply can't help groaning, though It will upset my mates, I know".
And his last brave words – they are famous now – Were: "Did they get the Gun?"

And Doug's was a hero's soul, I claim, He taught us how to die. Though writhing in his agony, These proud words from his smashed lips came: "I'm dying, but, by God! I'll die game!" And the pride of the boy was fine to see: "I died at the Gun, didn't I?"

At midnight, to the roar of the Guns, We buried these heroes three.

"Dear lads," the General called us men –

"Dear lads!" like a father to his sons!

For we were mates of those dauntless ones,

"Dear lads!" the General called us then,

"I'm proud of your Battery!"

Corporal McLarty survived the War and was employed by the AMP Society, "Mick" Taylor was employed by the Public Works Department Douglas Barrett Lennard was a Guildford identity, Stan Carter came from Fremantle

The poem was published in the Daily News Perth on Friday 3rd March 1916 having been reprinted from the Sydney Bulletin. It is the true story of 8 Battery 3rd Field Brigade at Gallipoli and composed by Corporal McLarty. The Society is indebted to the McLarty family allowing it to be published in ARTILLERYWA
