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ROYAL AUSTRALIAN ARTILLERY HISTORICAL SOCIETY PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2020

ear Members,

In December last year the RAAHS was represented at the TOMP's annual Volunteer Recognition Evening. I noted that some community members had been volunteering for nearly forty years!

After showing Dr David Honey MLA the Battery site in early 2019, I enjoyed the Christmas party he hosted at his Stirling Highway office – I made sure he was updated on our 5.25 project before he sampled too many ales.

Also in December another pleasant social event (Christmas party) was held to recognise the efforts of Society tunnel guides, cashiers, busy bee workers, Wednesday H.Q .members and their time deprived better halves. My thanks to the Committee members who made it happen. It was lovely to see our Society's ' Senior Member', Mrs Ronnie Roach, in attendance.

Exiting times ahead with construction work underway on the 5.25" site. In mid- January the contractor completed the concrete roof above the gun pit. A further month was required for it to cure. The contractor is Colgan Industries- who specialise in historic restorations.

In the 2020 Australia Day Honours List appeared the name of Society member Graham McKenzie-Smith. His award falls within the Member (AM) General Division. He has been recognised for significant service to military history preservation and forestry. On behalf of the membership of the RAAHS, I congratulate Graham on his award.

In mid- February, under the pretext- 'any publicity is good publicity', your President and Vice- President were photographed looking meaningfully out to sea from the 6" Observation Post. The image and an article titled 'Battle For Buckland Hill' appeared in the Western Suburbs community newspaper. The theme was about the balance between retaining existing native shrubs and the minimal pruning that we require to open up the 'historic vistas 'that a visitor would expect to see from the gun floors out to the Examination Area and Rottnest. T.O.M.P. are now awaiting permission from the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation to instigate staged pruning.

Early March saw the installation of safety screening around the top of the post W.W.2 radar hut. This was a TOMP initiative at their expense.

March 7th was our A.G.M. All business was dealt with in 80 minutes. I was pleased to present Long Service badges to several deserving members. One point was raised for general consideration for the 2021 AGM- that the RAA Association, and the RAAHS merge. Both groups have limited memberships and might benefit- please think about this item and feed any comments back to the respective Committees.

The next construction item for the 5.25" site is the entry point above the current open stairwell. It will resemble the 6" entrance alongside, and will secure the site. The area will then look a lot better when the old wire mesh safety screen is removed.

We will be seeking a quote to fabricate the turret and barrel from a local firm who is currently finishing the replica 155MM gun for the site at Point Peron. That replica will look impressive when set on its original Panama Mount, which was built in WW2 to cover the gap across to the south end of Garden Island.

As of March 22nd we closed the Tunnels to public tours. This was done in accordance with W.A. Health Dept. advice. That of course safeguards our members who would have been on duty . Our landlord-TOMP- was advised.

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WIRRAWAYS OVER ROTTNEST 1942

In the lifetime of many of us, Australia manufactured railway rolling stock including locomotives, motor vehicles, washing machines, refrigerators, vacuum cleaners, clothing and footwear and the list went on and on.

You will be hard pressed today to find an Australian manufactured bicycle, a shirt, or a pair of shoes and the list goes on and on.



he Wirraway (an Aboriginal word meaning "challenge") was a training and general purpose military aircraft manufactured in Australia by the Commonwealth Aircraft Corporation (CAC) between 1939 and 1946. It was an Australian development of the North American NA-16 training aircraft. The Wirraway has been credited as being the foundation of Australian aircraft manufacturing. During the Second World War, both Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) and Royal Australian Navy (RAN) deployed a number of Wirraways into combat roles, where they served in a makeshift light bomber/ground attack capacity, striking against the advancing forces of the Empire of Japan. While the type had been primarily used as a trainer and general purpose aircraft, being present in small quantities within the majority of front-line squadrons for these purposes; the aircraft was often pressed into combat when required. Typically, fighter versions of the Wirraway were operated over theatres such as New Guinea to perform ground attack missions and other Army cooperation tasks over extended periods until more advanced aircraft had become available in sufficient quantities. On 12 December 1942,

the Wirraway achieved its only shoot-down of an enemy aircraft—thought to be a Mitsubishi A6M Zero at the time, but later determined to be a Nakajima Ki-43 Hayabusa—while flown by Pilot Officer John S. "Jack" Archer.

Following the end of the conflict, the Wirraway was operated for over a decade as a trainer by the RAAF, the newly formed RAN Fleet Air Arm, and the squadrons of the Citizen Air Force.

During 1957, the last of the RAN's Wirraways was retired, having been replaced by the newer jet-powered de Havilland Vampire; as the CAC Winjeel came into squadron service, the RAAF phasing out its remaining fleet of Wirraways during the late 1950s.

Officially, the last military flight to be performed by the type was conducted on 27 April 1959. Notably, the Wirraway had also functioned as the starting point for the design of a wartime "emergency fighter", which was also developed and manufactured by CAC, known as the Boomerang.

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5.25 PROJECT



Planning to improve the 5.25in gun pit at Leighton has been going on for years but works actually commenced in 2019 with the first stage, enclosure by a concrete dome funded by LotteryWest being completed in Mar 20. RAAHS-WA Curator Don Rae and Vice President Graham McKenzie-Smith have been the driving forces to get the project underway and completed.

Further works subject to funding are:

the enclosure of the stairwell entry

erection of a lightweight replica gun-house with barrel on the concrete dome

installation of a diesel engine, generator and switchboard currently stored at Irwin Barracks into the engine room

the fitting out of the interior rooms with ammunition and displays in line with an approved interpretation plan

Members and volunteers will be kept up to date on ongoing progress.
