PRESIDENT'S REPORT HEADING INTO AUTUMN 2024**



Dear Members,

I hope you enjoyed the festive season and have returned to your normal routines for the new year.

In January another milestone was reached with the complete paint out of the 5.25" complex. This was done professionally using paint products generously donated by Taubmans (WA Division). With the specialist lighting now installed the effect on the eye is dramatic.

Also now installed are two electric fans which will ventilate the interior spaces. One vents up through the replica turret and the other via the original engine room exhaust passage. Above that one sits an external double "chinaman's hat" vent, inside a protective cage. The combined fan sounds are unobtrusive.

The set of 5.25" replica shells have been painted and have had their authentic period technical markings applied. Thanks to members Ron Cahill and Phil Angwen for their painstaking attention to detail. A matching number of brass cartridge cases (ex RAN donation), were sent away to be slightly shortened- thanks member Phil Rowson.

Late last year we allowed a Perth based film crew to use the tunnels for a 72 hour competition. I was happy to supervise their team from 10 AM to 10PM(!) The result is a light hearted sci- fi effort. Here is the link you can view it from. (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VXPcE20gDM8>).

Ahead of the March AGM, a bedside presentation of the Society's Certificate of Appreciation was awarded to Member Ken Thurston. Ken put in many years of effective service with the RAAHS.

Sadly, the Society lost two veteran members early this year. Vale, Malcolm Higham and Robert (Bob) Eggleston. Both men will be remembered through their constructive work in the 6" tunnels. The Society was represented at both family services.(D.Rae and D.Carter).

The next phase of 5.25" development is underway via the services of "multistory. Interpretation, museum, cultural & visitor experiences". RAAHS supplied the themes and data, this firm designed the text and photo displays and then sent the material off to a printer. RAAHS and a local Men's shed then combined to mount the finished products in the ex-ammunition alcoves beneath the turret. The three remaining rooms will also be fitted out.

In late February your Vice President and I were invited to the office of Minister Paul Papalia to receive a framed certificate recognising the LotteryWest grant we received earlier this year. The Minister recalled visiting the Tunnels when his boys were in high school.

In response to a TOMP OHS recommendation, RAAHS have now installed special handles at both tunnel interior doors, enabling any person with damaged hands to exit. We have also installed De-fibrillators at the 6" tunnels and at the Command Post as a necessary precaution.

Our AGM was held on the 9th of March. All Agenda items were carried out. I was pleased to hand out name badges signifying long -service by members to the Society, also several Certificates of Appreciation were presented, and I was especially pleased to award member Neil Lodge the Plaque, which is our highest recognition of service to the RAAHS.

I was humbled also to receive a Plaque- I thank the Committee accordingly.

I thank all members for the support you have given to the Society to date and welcome committee-man Jim Archibald as the new 2024 RAAHS President.

Biography - Lieutenant Colonel 8252825 Andrew Mark Dunley, RAA


Lieutenant Colonel Dunley enlisted in the Army Reserve as an Infantry Private on 12 July 1986, being posted to 16 Battalion, the Royal Western Australian Regiment. Lieutenant Colonel Dunley undertook Officer Cadet training in the Officer Cadet Training Unit, 5th Training Group from January 1988 to August 1989. He graduated as a Second Lieutenant and was posted as a Platoon Commander to 13 Field Supply Company, Royal Australian Ordnance Corps in August 1989.

Lieutenant Colonel Dunley undertook a corps transfer to the Royal Australian Artillery in September 1991, being posted to 7 Field Battery, 3 Field Regiment. Whilst in 7 Field Battery he fulfilled the appointments of Section Commander, Gun Position Officer, Forward Observer and Battery Captain. He was promoted to Captain in January 1997. During that time, Lieutenant Colonel Dunley also served as a Troop Commander in 2 Squadron, the Pilbara Regiment from May 1993 to May 1995 due to a civilian employment change.

He was promoted to Major in January 2004. Lieutenant Colonel Dunley was appointed as Battery Commander of 7 Field Battery where upon commanded the Battery from January 2005 to December 2007. In 2006, 7 Field Battery was awarded the Mount Schanck Trophy for the most effective Artillery Unit within the 2(AS) Division. Upon finishing his period of sub-unit command in 2007, Lieutenant Colonel Dunley was posted as a Career Manager to the Army Personnel Agency Perth where he served until commencing as a student at the Australian Command and Staff Course (Reserve). Following promotion to Lieutenant Colonel, he assumed command of Western Australian University Regiment in January 2014 for 3 years. From January 2017 to December 2019, LTCOL Dunley served on the directing staff of ACSC(R) at the Australian War College, followed by 3 years in the G7 Collective Training branch of HQ 2 (AS) Division. In 2020, LTCOL Dunley served on OP Bushfire Assist followed by OP COVID Assist in JTG 629.6. In 2022, LTCOL Dunley deployed as an Operations Planner in the US led Combined Joint Task Force on Operation Inherent Resolve in the Middle East.

In his civilian capacity, Lieutenant Colonel Dunley is employed as a Relationship Executive in the Commonwealth Bank. He is married to Donna and has 4 adult children.

Boxer CRV (Combat Reconnaissance Vehicle)

At Eurosatory 2014, Rheinmetall presented the Boxer IFV (Infantry Fighting Vehicle) variant, this was equipped with the Rheinmetall LANCE 30mm two-man turret. Combining the Boxer inherent high level of protection and the unique mobility with the latest turret technology, the IFV variant presented state-of-the-art capabilities to face the requirements of the time.

LAND 400 Phase 2 came into place in June 2023 to modernise Army's Armoured Fighting Vehicle capability, which will provide mounted support to Defence operations for decades into the future, but most importantly will enhance the safety, security and protection of Australian troops. The Boxer CRV will replace the Australian Light Armoured Vehicle, which has seen extensive operational service since its introduction in 1996.

The Boxer CRV will operate in a range of environments, from the littoral environment of our near region, to contested complex urban environments. The high levels of protection, firepower and mobility provided by the vehicle will enable sustained operations, varying from peacekeeping to close combat.

Defence has contracted Rheinmetall Defence Australia to deliver and support 211 Boxer 8x8 Combat Reconnaissance Vehicle (Boxer) for the Australian Army.

The Boxer CRV will be delivered in two blocks, known as Block I and Block II.

Under Block I, Rheinmetall Defence Australia has delivered the first 25 Boxer CRVs (12 Reconnaissance and 13 Multi-Purpose Variants) to Defence, which are currently in use with Army and demonstrating high levels of availability and notable levels and performance.

The remaining 186 Boxer CRVs (known as Block II) are currently in the design and testing phases respectively.

The vehicles will be split across 5 variants:

- Reconnaissance
- Repair
- Recovery
- Command and Control
- Joint Fires and Surveillance.

The majority of these Block II CRVs will be built and assembled in Australia at Rheinmetall Defence Australia's Military Vehicle Centre of Excellence facility in Redbank, Queensland.

BEREAVEMENTS

It is with much sadness that we advise the passing of two of our long serving Members:

MALCOLM HIGHAM
11TH August 1927 – 21ST January 2024

Malcolm, a retired farmer from the Williams District, joined the Society on 8th February 1991. He brought with him a vast knowledge of military history, particularly that of the Western Australian Colony's contribution to the Boer Wars. He was a Member of the Boer War Association WA Branch and visited South Africa frequently – particularly Westralia Hill so named by the State Colonial contingents that fought there with distinction.

Malcolm was a skilled model maker and two exceptional examples of the 6 inch and 5.25 inch Gun Emplacements are displayed at the Leighton Battery Heritage Site Command Post. Another outstanding example is of the 5.5 inch Medium Field Gun displayed at the Society's Office at Irwin Barracks.

For some years Malcolm carried out the duties of Librarian.

Failing health prompted his retirement from actively assisting the Society and his recent years were spent in a retirement home. Malcolm's life partner Pip pre-deceased him some years ago. He is survived by a son, two daughters and numerous grand and great grandchildren.

ROBERT EGGLESTON
28TH March 1945 – 16TH February 2024

Rob introduced himself to the Society on 1st October 1992 expressing his interest in Artillery as he had served as a National Serviceman in an Artillery Regiment in South Vietnam 1966 – 1967. He was immediately made welcome!

Rob was a very practical "amateur" bringing with him many manual skills that fitted him admirably to the ongoing tasks associated with the restoration of the Leighton Battery Heritage Site – many similar tasks are still "work in progress"

Another skill Rob possessed was photography – not only taking photographs but being able to develop, print and enlarge film images – in the days prior to digital cameras! He assumed the responsibility of converting the Society's considerable donated collection of WW II photos and negatives setting up what is today a credible archive.

Rob's dedication to the Society was evident in his willingness to become a Committee Person and a regular volunteer at the Leighton Battery monthly Busy Bee sessions – maintaining both commitments until failing health prevented him continuing.

After a lengthy period of ill health Rob eventually passed away peacefully surrounded by his Family. He is survived by his wife Anne, son Luke, daughters Ashe and Kate and two grandchildren.

Malcolm and Rob may have passed away but they will not be forgotten.
